CSLC CNPP reaches out to help storm victims at resource fair

CSLC's Community Navigator Pilot Program (CNPP) has been working aggressively to help victims of the March EF-4 tornado disaster in Delta to get back to some normalcy. CNPP reps attended town hall meetings that were held by Congressman Bennie Thompson in Belzoni and Winona, Miss. "We also attended a Storm Victim Resource Fair that was held by Dr. Pam "Boss Lady" Chatman in Greenville, Miss.," said CSLC CNPP Project Director Antwan Clark. Chatman is founder of the non-profit, Boss Lady Economic Planning and Development Workforce Transportation, Inc.

"During all the meetings, we let the victims know that we can help them register for FEMA, MEMA, FHLB of Dallas, USDA, and apply for SBA assistance free of charge," Clark said.

Clark also reported that in February, CNPP held "A Mississippi Delta Lending Fair" in Cleveland, Miss. as an outreach in collaboration with Boss Lady Economic Planning and Development Workforce

Transportation, Inc., and the Delta State University Women Minority Development Center, "A Mississippi Delta Lending Fair" offered "free" financial and technical assistance (TA) to underserved businesses and potential startups. (Below are several highlights.)

Lucretia Holmes, the Project Director and Jacqueline Saffold, Coordinator of the School Violence Prevention Program TIME-Transforming Improving Mississippi Saffold Education. is currently implementing the TIME Program in the HCCSD implementing Positive Action K-5 and Mind Matters K6-12. In order to prevent youth violence, TIME program manager and staff understand and recognize the risk factors. "This program helps us strengthen communities, parents, teachers, and students," said Holmes. "Having a third eye will help us make much-needed referrals to Life Help for immediate evaluations and make reports to the proper authority, knowing your trusted adults, and afterschool programs to help prevent and reduce violence. Together, we are making a difference."

The 2023 HCCHS graduating senior class have learned new violence prevention skills to take with them as they travel through TIME on their new journey in life. Teachers in the HCCSD applaud the TIME program and said they have benefited from it by listening to the implementation in their classrooms and using some of the skills to help manage conflicts. The youths K-5 are super excited about the program and remind their classmates of what they have learned when they feel hurt or sad. They find it easier now to say I'm sorry and feel good about doing good. "A hardy salute and congratulations to all of our TIME graduates!" expressed Holmes.

Cannon Consulting encouraged them to take the Credit Plus class sponsored by Community Bank. After completing the class, they qualified for a loan that they used to start their catering business, The Wright Way Catering, LLC.

According to CSLC SBA CNPP spoke partner, Henry Luckett of Knowledge Info, Community Bank was so impressed with the services of the mother-daughter catering business that it contracted with The Wright Way Catering to

provide meals for other Credit Plus classes the bank sponsors, averaging two to three orders per month according to Cannon Consulting recent Spotlight on Clients publication. The spotlight also indicated that the business is off to a good start, and its future is bright.

CSLC now has an in-house certified USDA 502 loan packager


The Community Students Learning Center (CSLC) now has an in-house certified USDA 502 loan packager, Kalandria Newman. Newman is excited and ready to assist in meeting the needs of eligible future homeowners.

CSLC participates with the USDA rural development on the USDA 502 Homeowner Loan /504 Direct Repair and/or Grant programs. These loans and grant are available to help low to very low-income individuals in rural areas, purchase, build or repair their homes.

She is also USDA-trained to assist those eligible homeowners who are in much need of standard, up-to-code, and safety repairs to navigate the application process. Newman is a native of West, Miss. in Holmes County. Her education background includes attending Jackson State University, where she received her bachelor's degree in Healthcare Administration. Her skills and expertise include, but are not limited to, computer proficiency, communication skills, and organizational and time management skills.

Since joining the CSLC staff, she has also worked closely with the Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas/BankPlus Affordable Housing program.

"My plan is to stay focus and trust God," said Newman. "It is a pleasure to be here at CSLC working and learning from everyone."

An anonymous donor puts grateful smiles on 25 citizens' faces



Year after year, the CSLC receive testimony to how appreciative citizens are for the Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas/BankPlus Affordable Housing Rehabilitation grant program. Knowledge Info & Cannon Consulting help Chef Brown increase visibility

CSLC SBA Community Navigator Pilot Program's (CNPP) spokes, Knowledge Info, LLC and one of its contractors, Cannon Consulting are responsible for another food business success story. Just ask Chef Phillip Brown, owner of Chef Phillip's Creative Foods, LLC. Based on a recent Cannon Consulting's Spotlight on Client, Chef Brown's business had a remarkably tasty business, but it lacked visibility.

According to the article, "through the SBA Community Navigator Pilot Program, Cannon Consulting and Knowledge Info, LLC recommended adding a Google Business Profile Page to boost visibility.

Executing such a TA recommendation has proven to be very successful for Chef Phillip's Creative Foods, LLC. As reported by Cannon, Brown has "secured an added \$20,000 in revenue since November 2022 through an additional 30 event bookings. This type collaboration in helping small businesses is exactly what the CNPP is all

Fresh Start, LLC's technical consultant helps nutritionist secure a MDPH grant

Navigator Pilot Program (CNPP) spokes, Fresh Start Enterprise, LLC, is helping him to do that in Holmes County. Lucretia Holmes, who consults with Fresh Start, is known for constantly searching for grant opportunities to make people aware of them. One of her technical assistance and outreach efforts proved successful for Contave. He is the recipient of a \$15,000 grant to implement the National Diabetes Prevention Program (NDPP) in Holmes County, Miss.

"This grant, according to Contave, provides a remarkable opportunity to make a positive impact on the health and well-

being of our community. I would like to express my gratitude to the Mississippi Department of Public Health for their support and confidence in our ability to carry out this important initiative. He said he is grateful to Holmes for the referral. "Her passion for community health and wellness inspired me to pursue this funding," Contave said.

"I am truly honored to have been selected as a recipient of the grant...Starting in June of 2023, we are excited to commence the NDPP in Holmes County, and I want to emphasize that enrollment is still open for those who are interested in participating. Together, we can work towards preventing and managing diabetes, improving the lives of our residents, and fostering a healthier future for our community," he said in a message last month.
