Good News! The CSLC HIPPY program now serves Jackson, Miss. area

Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) is a developmentally appropriate, early literacy curriculum that promotes children's cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development. The curriculum consists of easy-to-use educational activity packets and storybooks developed for parents of children ages 2-5. Parents engage with the curriculum by role-playing the parent-child activities with a home visitor from the same community and often a former HIPPY parent. A professionally trained program coordinator supervises all home visitors. CSLC HIPPY is a part of the International HIPPY program. It has served families of preschool children in Holmes County since 2009. Due to its success, among other aspects, CSLC HIPPY has been given the green light by its national leaders to serve families of preschool-age children in the Jackson area (Hinds County) with this proven, effective research-based curriculum.

On September 18, 2023, the CSLC HIPPY Program expanded to Jackson, MS. "several families in the Jackson area enrolled in the program," said CSLC HIPPY Coordinator Lubertha Banks-Mosley. "Mrs. Valorie Young is the Home Visitor for the Hinds County area."



Parents in the Jackson area are already pleased with the program. Chandrian Jones said: "My son Jaxson Watkins is three years old and in a private home daycare. The HIPPY Program has been a blessing for my son and me. Just as pre-K, it's fostering early cognitive development in his social skills, promoting language acquisition, and preparing my child for academic success in later years. This program also improves school readiness, better emotional

regulation, and a foundation for lifelong learning for my child. It also allows us to spend more time together learning."

We have begun the enrollment for the 2023-2024 Program," said Banks-Mosley, and we are incredibly grateful to BankPlus for their continuous support. "We are very excited about the growing success of our HIPPY Program, and we are extremely thankful to all of our contributors and donors who help keep it going and ensure that these children begin school ready. We could not successfully implement HIPPY without our generous and kind-hearted donors and supporters."

CSLC's STOP Project Director 'highly recommended' to serve on a national conf. panel

The Community Students Learning Center (CSLC) is pleased to share that its Project Director, Lucretia Holmes, for the Bureau of Justice Assistance's (BJA) STOP Grant was asked to join the Bureau of Justice Assistance and the National Center for School Safety (NCSS) on August 8-10, 2023, in Richmond, Virginia for the 2023 STOP School Violence National Conference the National Center for School Safety (NCSS). She was asked to attend and invited to serve on one of the national panels with other BJA grantees. In a letter from Brent Allen Miller, MA, PMP Training Manager National Center for School Safety,

University of Michigan School of Public Health, is this excerpt: "Hello Lucretia, "We hope you can join us as a panelist for a moderated discussion with other STOP grantees. You come highly recommended by our School Safety Specialists. This panel is one of four distinct sessions that will provide attendees an opportunity to learn about the work of their peers."

During the 75-minute panel, Holmes and other grantees discussed and answered questions "about your organizational context, your role, your STOP grant work, and other relevant details around how you have addressed school safety (e.g., population served, geographic considerations, local and state landscape)" as state in the invitation letter.

CSLC Executive Director Beulah Greer also attended the conference. She participated in the breakout groups and explained how the CSLC grant has been a success because of the relationship that CSLC has with the Holmes County Consolidated School District (HCCSD) and School Superintendent Dr. Jennifer Wilson, who is "passionate about the safety of students." The STOP grant collaborative partnership with HCCSD is referred to as TIME.



CSLC FHLB/BankPlus Affordable Housing Program affords residents renewed holiday spirits

Thanks to the services of the Community Students Learning Center's (CSLC) Federal Home Loan Bank (FHLB) of Dallas/BankPlus Affordable Housing Program (AHP), residents in Holmes and other targeted counties are experiencing a brighter, safer, and pleasing spirits this holiday season. More than 39 Low-income homeowners have been blessed to qualify for much-needed home repairs (rehabilitation) during this granting cycle. To date, and across the years of being approved for the FHLB of Dallas grant through BankPlus, CSLC has facilitated the rehab of more than 247. This holiday season and beyond, Holmes County homeowner Sallie Ree Brooks is among those many grateful and excited individuals whose

homes qualified for participation in the program. "Oh, she was so pleased and grateful when she saw the work the contractors had done to repair her kitchen," said CSLC Housing Rehab Coordinator
